RUSSIAN ARMIES, IN UTTER ROUT, **FLEE FROM POLES**

Peace Terms Not to Be Made at Minsk Now, Say Warsaw Inhabitants.

TERMS OF SOVIET ARE REJECTED BY POLES

Continued Advance for Polish Forces Brings Renewed Confidence.

WARSAW, Aug. 10.—The Polish offensive is now in full swing. More than 10,000 prisoners, 30 cannons, 300 machine guns and thousands of supply carts have been captured from the Bolsheviki.

The Poles have occupied Plonsk, Pultask and Wyskow, through which the Reds drove in their sweep towards the capital. Owing to the Polish pressure from the Northeast, it is reported that the Bolsheviki are withdrawing their forces which reached the Vistula south of the Pressuain border and to the northwest of Warsaw.
