### **1. West Knoxville Meeting to Explore Speeding in Residential Neighborhoods**

The City of Knoxville next week will conduct the third of five public meetings on residential traffic safety as it seeks public comment for possible changes in its traffic calming policy.

So far, meetings have been held in North Knoxville and South Knoxville. The one next week is in West Knoxville. However, **you do not have to be a resident of West Knoxville to attend and participate.**

The meeting begins at 6 p.m. Thursday, October 10, at Arnstein Jewish Community Center, 6800 Deane Hill Drive. City officials will make presentations about traffic calming and then record the comments, questions, ideas and concerns of city residents and representatives of city neighborhood groups and other organizations.

This input will be critical in helping city staff draft the traffic calming policy for the coming years. A response to the public input and a first draft of the new policy will be published in the first quarter, followed by a public meeting for additional comment. The draft will be reworked as needed and then presented to the public and to City Council.

The city encourages citizens to visit and explore its traffic calming web site --- located at [www.cityofknoxville.org/trafficalming](http://www.cityofknoxville.org/trafficalming) --- to become familiar with the issues. Whether the city resumes installation of physical devices such as speed humps will depend on several factors, including funding during an era of tight municipal budgets.

If you care about this issue, now is the time to speak up! After the West Knoxville meeting, two more meetings are scheduled:

## **2. League of Women Voters to Conduct Candidate Forum**

All seven candidates running for Knoxville City Council will participate in a nonpartisan Candidate Forum organized by the League of Women Voters of Knoxville and Knox County.

The League will hold the Forum on October 14 at 7:00 p.m. at the Cansler Family YMCA, 616 Jessamine Street, which attendees can access from Interstate 40 or by KAT bus. There is ample parking in the parking lot between the YMCA and the O'Connor Senior Center.

Responding to concerns of candidates in recent election cycles about the increasing numbers of candidate forums with low attendance, the League has worked with city and neighborhood groups in organizing this forum.

"Groups with members who will encourage citizen participation in this city election and forum include Parkridge Community Organization, South Knoxville Neighborhood and Business Coalition, Forest Heights Neighborhood Association, Pond Gap Neighborhood Association, and Fairmont/Emoriland Neighborhood Association," the League stated. "We anticipate that additional groups will still join in."

#### **6. Conservation Expo on October 12 Promises Music, Art, Kids Activities, More**

Less than two weeks away, Knoxville's Centennial Conservation Expo promises a full slate of family-friendly events, exhibits and entertainment.

The Exposition will take place from 10 a.m.-5 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 12, at Chilhowee Park. Admission and parking are free. The Expo celebration marks the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the National Conservation Exposition of 1913, which drew a million visitors to Chilhowee Park. A commemorative program available for \$5 at the Expo will reproduce the original 1913 Conservation Exposition program, along with new text and photos highlighting the past 100 years of conservation in East Tennessee.

Sponsored by the City of Knoxville, along with Pathway Lending and Strata-G, the Centennial Conservation Expo will include exhibits and displays from a wide variety of local and regional organizations, conservation-themed art exhibits, live entertainment, children's games and activities, conservation-themed lectures and slide shows, free paddleboarding on the Chilhowee Park lake from 1-4 p.m. (weather permitting), a tree tour of Chilhowee Park led by Knoxville urban forester Kasey Krouse, and exhibition boxing matches all day inside the Golden Gloves Arena.

An opening ceremony at 11 a.m. will feature Mayor Madeline Rogero, distinguished guests, and keynote speaker Leila Pinchot, the great-granddaughter of legendary conservationist

Gifford Pinchot. Gifford Pinchot was the first head of the U.S. Forest Service and served as the chairman of the advisory board for the 1913 Conservation Exposition. Leila Pinchot recently received her doctorate in Natural Resources from the University of Tennessee, and she will talk about the legacy of the past century of conservation efforts here and elsewhere.

In association with the Expo, the nearby Parkridge neighborhood will host a historic homes tour that day. The “Barber Houses of Parkridge” tour will showcase seven neighborhood homes designed by the Knoxville architect George Barber. The tour will be open from 1-5 p.m. Parking will be at Ashley Nicole Dream Playground, 620 Winona St. Cost is \$10 per ticket. Children 12 and under are free.
